MEMBERSHIP NEWS

Fall is coming soon and that means hunting season for many ORSA members. For this reason, we can expect considerable use of the ranges. ORSA members will need to plan ahead to assure they can get some range time. Dove season opens in early September meaning there will be an interest in practicing wing-shooting on the Skeet, Trap, and Sporting Clays ranges. Archery season opens at the end of September indicating people will want to tune their bows on the Archery ranges. And the approaching gun and muzzleloader seasons in the Fall mean more hunters sighting in firearms on the 200 yard Bench Rest range. These individuals will also need to plan their activities around a growing number of shooting matches that will be hosted at many of the ranges. Consult the Rangefinder calendars. And try to take advantage of the low use times for most of the ranges during weekdays if possible. Remember that ORSA members can bring guests for 3 visits, but after those visits the guests need to be encouraged to join ORSA.

ORSA members are reminded that the Rangefinder is useful as a comprehensive general guide to ORSA activities and information. However, due to its printed nature and a

process of being mailed through the postal system, it has some limitations in content and timeliness. Other more comprehensive and timely ways of being in touch with ORSA activities start with the ORSA Web site (www.orsaonline.org) which should be consulted regularly because it contains links to information that may not have met Rangefinder publishing deadlines such as the current link to the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency sponsored Bow Hunter Education Course which will be held September 8 at ORSA. In addition, some shooting clubs have their own web sites so they can manage their specific information in a timely manner. BOWHUNTER EDUCATION CLASS

Oak Ridge Sportsmen's Association (ORSA) will be hosting a Tennessee Wildlife Management Agency sponsored Bowhunter Education Class on September 8 from 8 to 4 pm. Bowhunter Education is required by many states and municipalities for individuals to use archery equipment for hunting. If you are a new hunter wanting to learn about bowhunting, this is an excellent class to attend.

Students, both ORSA and the public, have two options to complete the Bowhunter Education Class.

Option # 1 – Attend all day at ORSA and complete both the morning classroom and the afternoon field portion of the class. Taken this way the course and certification is free.

Option # 2 – Take the online Bowhunter Education class through the NBEF (National Bowhunter Education Foundation) for a fee (<https://www.bowhuntered.com/tennessee/>). This completes the morning, classroom

portion of the class. A test is taken online at the end of the class and the printout is brought in to the class to complete the field portion after lunch. This allows students who have to travel a fair distance to take the morning session as an online course ahead of time and drive the morning of the class and complete the field portion.

AMERICAN RIMFIRE BENCHREST ASSOCIATION PROGRAM (ARA)

We will be holding our next ARA Rimfire Benchrest Club Match on Friday, September 7, at 3 PM on the Competition Range. There will be 4 targets of 25 bullseyes shot in 20 minutes each at 50 yards. There has been a FACTORY RIFLE CLASS added to the program with an award for each target winner as well as the aggregate. To be in the FACTORY RIFLE CLASS the rifle must have the original stock and barrel without any muzzle or barrel tuning devices. Bedding and trigger modifications are allowed as well as any power scope. There will also be a HEAVY TARGET RIFLE class for traditional prone style rifles such as Remington 37's and 40-X's, Winchester 52's, Freeland/BSA's, Anschutz 54's, Walthers, CMP/Kimber. There will be a few unlimited class rifles available if someone without a rifle and benchrest equipment wants to participate and plenty of match ammo available at \$12 per box. You can shoot as many targets as you like.

We will also be holding a 6 Target ARA Tournament with

registration starting at 10:00 AM on Saturday September 8 like the Friday afternoon shoot.

The AUTO RIMFIRE BENCHREST PROGRAM (ARBA)

We will be holding an ARBA Rimfire Benchrest Club Match on Sunday September 9 with registration starting at 10:00 AM. There will be 4 targets of 20 bullseyes fired in 15 minutes each.

There will be a Factory Rifle and an Unlimited Rifle Class with both Junior and Senior Categories. Any 22 caliber semi-automatic and any power scope can be used. The Ruger 10-22 is the most popular, but Marlin Model 60's and others are also competitive.

RANGE SAFETY - SITUATIONAL AWARENESS

On May 25, 2018 at 1640 hrs, I flew a drone from Target Point 18 at the 1000 yard line in a southwesterly by southeasterly direction towards the targets. The intent was to produce promotional footage for use by the HP Rifle program, and was sanctioned by the president of R&P. Initial conditions were Field 4 was active, and contrary to established practices, access to and from the HP range was not limited with closed gates at the 600-yard line or 1000 yard lines. About 4 minutes later, the unit stopped at the 300 yard line, hovered, and returned to its launch point. The return to its launch point was not known to me, though because contact was lost with the unit (due to extant interference). Believing I was at a safe distance, I then went down along the west tree line to reestablish contact and was not able to do so. At that time, the match director waved me off and I continued up the road. In the meantime, I was unaware that this created a distraction to Field 4 shooters. An hour later, I drove down the still-open road, parked at 600 yards and continued searching. Shortly thereafter I was hailed and told that the unit was lodged in overhead tree branches at the launch point; and that I created a disturbance. I apologized and realized that this activity should have been coordinated with the S&T shooters.

From the vantage point of S&T, and subsequent additional discussion with the match director the very next day I was able to confirm how the drone was problematic. What looks ok from one vantage point may not be from another, even when indications are positive or ambiguous or conflicted, such as open gates/free access and distance. This was all because of tunnel vision, induced by a sense of urgency to recover the drone. That mindset is something we all must be aware can happen when you feel compelled to accomplish a task. Under

those conditions tunnel vision will set in and you lose your situational awareness - what other shooters are doing around you. The best defense is self-awareness of the onset of that feeling that you must accomplish something and will do whatever you have to do to complete that task. That is when you had better just stop and re-center yourself. To start with, be aware of the rules, and how they apply to what you are going to do before firing a shot or even thinking about going down range, and if you aren't sure, ask - communicate with those around you (like the match director or range safety officer) - and determine for sure what the exact status of the range you are firing on - or if what you are about to do will affect what is going on the adjacent range, for that matter.

If you don't exercise due caution, at best - there will be an accountability visit with the ORSA Board to explain what happened, or worse, someone can get hurt. In my case I was suspended for 90 days. An additional gate and signs are now in place and should contribute to preventing this from occurring again. But no matter how many signs or gates, policies, rules, or range safety personnel we have - we are responsible for maintaining situational awareness. Take a tip from me and stop and think just an extra moment and visualize the consequences of breaking the rules. Stop yourself from doing the wrong thing - it takes discipline, but you have to be willing to stop if things don't feel right. Nothing is worth getting hurt over. Listen to that still small voice. Not just at ORSA, but in all things that you do which carry risk and consequences. At the end of the day I wish to once again apologize for the interference and disruption caused by my oversight.

You will receive one-on-one instruction from experienced competitors.

You may bring your own US Service Rifle (AR-15, M1-Garand, or M1-A and ammo); or, use a club rifle and ammo. If you bring your gear, cost is \$5.00. If you are using ORSA rifle, ammo and equipment; cost is \$30.00.

If you wish to participate, please read and follow the instructions below. RSVP to Alan Strachn at: alanstrachn@gmail.com. Answer the following questions:

- What is your Name, email address, and are you 18 or older?
- Are you furnishing your own rifle and ammo?
- Will you need a club AR-15? (note, only club ammo may only be fired in these rifles)
- What is your suit jacket size? (helps us fit you with a shooting jacket)
- Are you left-handed?

Please Read and Follow These Instructions:

- Schedule: Report to the ORSA Indoor Range at 8:00 AM Saturday, March 17th.
- You will register, be fitted with a shooting jacket and mitt, be assigned a Relay and Target, and be paired with a coach. Additionally, an introductory course of instruction will be provided.

Course of Fire: All Firing Conducted from 200 Yards

- 5 prone slow fire sighter shots
- 10 shots prone slow fire
- 10 shots rapid fire fired from the prone position with a magazine change
- 10 shots rapid fire fired from the sitting position with a magazine change
- 10 shots slow fire standing

Fees:

- \$30.00 for club rifle, ammo, and equipment
- \$5.00 if participant brings their own rifle, equipment and ammo

Range Requirements, Safety, and Comfort:

- Eye and Ear Protection are Required on all ORSA Ranges and must be furnished by participants
- Dress for the weather predicted
- Bring plenty to drink, and a light lunch

IS THE SECOND AMENDMENT EQUAL TO THE OTHER RIGHTS IN THE BILL OF RIGHTS?

We all know and understand the Second Amendment. I have written many words about the origins and history that undergird the Second Amendment. But is the Second Amendment treated with the same reverence or respect as the other Rights enshrined in the Constitution?

If an American citizen crossed over a state line, is his or her right to freedom of speech or freedom of assembly curtailed by that state? Does each and every state have laws that impact freedom of the press? Does a state have a right to establish a "state religion"? Is a citizen of one state prohibited from petitioning another state redress from some injury or complaint? Do states have their own laws about quartering soldiers in private homes? Of course not.

So then why is it okay for a concealed carry permit citizen to be in legal jeopardy as they travel from state to state? In practice, a citizen's right to keep and bear arms depends largely where one lives. States like California, Illinois, New Jersey, and New York are Constitution free zones where the state legislatures are in direct contravention to the U.S. Constitution.

The 14th Amendment reads in part: *Section 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States, and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States, nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law, not to deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.*

During the debates surrounding the passage of the 14th Amendment, both its author, John Bingham, and its principal sponsor, John Howard, regarded gun ownership as a fundamental civil right that needed national protection against inevitable local subversion. Attempts to limit fundamental rights by location, Bingham wrote, would turn the Constitution's "sublime and beautiful scripture" into a "horrid charter of wrong." "The privileges and immunities of citizens of a State are chiefly defined in the first eight amendments to the Constitution of the United States."

After two of the most recent Supreme Court's rulings on the side of Second Amendment rights were relieved. In 2008 the *D.C. v. Heller* affirmed the right to self-defense and the 2010 *McDonald v. Chicago* case affirmed that the Heller case applied to the states (not just Washington D.C.). But since these cases the Supreme Court has passed on other cases related to the Second Amendment. Frustrated by this, Justice Clarence Thomas has written *"Despite the clarity with which we described the Second Amendment's core protection for the right of self-defense, lower courts, including the ones here, have failed to protect it... Second amendment rights are no less protected by our Constitution than other rights enumerated in that document."*

One obvious next step would be for Congress to require that each state respect carry permits that have been issued by another state. This would end the dilemma carry permit holders now face where their rights guaranteed by the Constitution just because they move from one locale to another as well as treat the Second Amendment just like the 1st, 3rd, 4th, 5th and other rights in the Bill of Rights.



ANTI-GUN RIGHTS STATE OF THE MONTH - NEW JERSEY

The new Democrat Governor, Phil Murphy, has stated that his administration "will sign every piece of gun violence prevention that (former) Governor Christie has vetoed; require all gun retailers to carry at least one smart gun once they are commercially available; raise taxes on gun purchases; and add even more obstacles to the acquisition of firearms."

Some of the news laws signed by the Governor:

S102: reduces the maximum magazine capacity restriction from 15 to 10 rounds;

S. 160/A. 1181: would allow for the suspension of gun rights by health professionals;

S.2376/A.2758: codifies justifiable need standard for the issuance of concealed-carry permits;

S.2374/A.2757: requires background checks on all firearm transfers, including private sales;

S.2259/A.1217: creates extreme risk protection orders whereby firearms can be seized and constitutional rights suspended with no due process.

ANTI-GUN RIGHTS STATE HONORABLE MENTION - CALIFORNIA

A California "microstamping" law that requires new semi-

automatic handguns automatically imprint bullet casings with identifying information has been upheld by the 9th circuit court of appeals in a 2:1 split decision - despite the fact that the technology doesn't exist, reports ABC News.

The microstamping law - the first of its kind in the nation signed in 2007 by then-governor Arnold Schwarzenegger, took effect in 2013. It requires that brand new handguns sold in California imprint the gun's make, model and serial number in "two or more places" on each bullet casing from a spent round.

The result of the new law was Smith & Wesson, Ruger and other manufacturers opting to pull out of California.

Gun rights advocates have slammed the law, as the technology doesn't exist to stamp bullet casings in two places as the law is written, and even if it did, criminals could replace or file down the firing pin and any other mechanism to "microstamp."

The law became effective as soon as the California Department of Justice certified that the technology used to create the imprint was available. When this certification occurred in 2013, the State clarified that the certification confirmed only "the lack of any patent restrictions on the imprinting technology, not the availability of the technology itself." In layman's terms, the state was saying that nothing was stopping someone from developing the technology, so it was "available," even though it wasn't. -NRA-ILA

As a result, compliance with the law's "dual placement microstamping" requirement was both practically and legally "impossible," according to court documents from a lawsuit brought by the National Shooting Sports Foundation (NSSF) and the Sporting Arms and Ammunition Manufacturers Institute (SAAMI). In support of their claim, writes the NRA Institute for Legislative Action, the plaintiffs cited an existing provision of California law, Civil Code section 3531, which states "[t]he law never requires impossibilities."

California gun rights advocates say the law effectively bans the sale of new semi-automatic handguns in the state. And what did the 9th circuit say to that?

Too bad - as residents can still buy used handguns that don't carry the yet-to-be invented microstamping technology, as well as any guns on a pre-approved roster - thus, the inability to buy a new semiautomatic handgun that's not on the roster doesn't infringe on the 2nd Amendment right to self-defense.

Writing for the majority, Judge M. Margaret McKeown said the inability to buy particular guns did not infringe the 2nd Amendment right to self-defense in the home.

"Indeed, all of the plaintiffs admit that they are able to buy an operable handgun suitable for self-defense — just not the exact gun they want," she said.

McKeown, joined by Judge J. Clifford Wallace, also rejected the argument that the stamping technology was impossible to implement. -ABC News

Calguns foundation executive director Brandon Combs

said that the 9th circuit used a less rigorous judicial standard in order to arrive at its "policy preferences."

"Really what the 9th Circuit is saying and has said in other cases basically is as long as a person that is law abiding has access to one handgun inside of their home, then that's it," he said. "That's the extent of their right. We think that's quite wrong."

Dissenting from the majority was Judge Jay Bybee, who cited conflicting evidence over whether the microstamping technology was even technologically feasible - and that if the state adopted an impossible requirement that no gun manufacturer can satisfy, it would not help the state solve handgun crimes and would illegally restrict gun purchases.

As Breitbart's resident Second Amendment columnist AWR Hawkins detailed in 2015, Maryland canceled a similar "ballistic fingerprinting" program after 15 years and \$5 million dumped into the program resulted in no crimes solved. The law did not call for "microstamping" like California's - rather it relied on unique metallurgical "fingerprints" left behind by a gun's firing pin. Each new gun sold in the state would need to be fired one time, and the resulting bullet casing sent to the state's police headquarters. Unfortunately, while the forensic technology to match a bullet casing with a gun exists - the computerized system designed to sort and matched images of casings never worked - so the state canceled the program.

"7 TIPS TO PREVENT A DEADLY ENCOUNTER."

In continuing to help make our members be their own risk managers we wanted to introduce "7 Tips to Prevent a Deadly Encounter."

1. Avoidance is the best way to stay out of harms way.
2. Think like a cop and mentally practice for deadly encounters.
3. Positioning is the key in tactics. As a concealed carrier you must think about positioning yourself in places to provide the best defensive advantage.
4. Training in Situational Awareness is more important than range time. We all have the ability to identify when something is out of place or someone does not match the surroundings. Practice people watching as you enter any situation so you can pick out potential threats.
5. Call for help if you can before and after you react.
6. Don't be the Aggressor in a Road Rage Incident.
7. Know your limitations and when to tactically retreat. You are not a doctor or an officer, so please know your limitations. Just because you have a gun does not mean that you have to continue moving forward. Always keep your eyes on them as you back away so you can see that a weapon is not being accessed.
