She has recently received a sponsorship from SK Ammunition Company as well as local barrel maker, Fred Feddersen owner of Feddersen Gun Barrels. Joe Chacon who is a gunsmith and Director of ARBA recently built Shelby a new gun for 2019 using a barrel and action provided by Fred Feddersen.

Shelby and another one of our junior shooters, Lexi Davis traveled to the Boerne Shooting Center in Boerne, TX over Thanksgiving to participate in the filming of a video that will be used by SK Ammunition Company in commercials and promotional materials next year. - If you have never tried shooting clay targets I urge to give it a try. Come to either range and ask for the RSO on duty and they will be glad to help you get started.

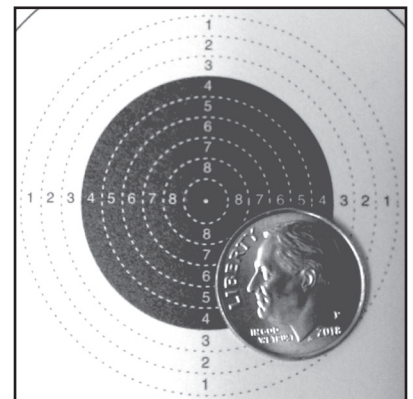

INDOOR AIRGUN LEAGUE

We'd like to invite everyone to come check out the Indoor Airgun League. Matches are held the 1st and 3rd Saturday each month from 10:00 to noon, and there's no registration fee. This ain't your Red Ryder BB gun! As you can see, the 9-Ring is barely larger than the .177 pellets we shoot, and the 10-Ring is just a dot. Cut the ring and get the higher score, completely obliterate the dot for an X. We've seen a few 100's, but not with ten X's...yet.

Some of us shoot the very capable Daisy 853, available refurbished from the CMP for a mere \$105. You can use the peep sights that come with it (or add a \$30 scope), grab a couple sandbags or a benchrest, and you're ready to go. Match quality ammo sells for \$8.50 for a tin of 500. You'll also see some very high-quality benchrest air rifles and everything in between. We shoot at either 10 meters or 50 feet, whichever the rifle and your skill allows. We have regular participants ranging in age from 11 to.....well, let's just say considerably older than that.

CIVILIAN MARKSMANSHIP PROGRAM (CMP) SERVICE RIFLE CLINIC MARCH 16TH, 2019, 8:00 AM - ORSA INDOOR RANGE

The ORSA Rifle and Pistol Club will conduct a CMP Service Rifle Clinic on March 16th, 2019. You will learn to fire a Service Rifle accurately without the need for sand bags or a bipod. It's not magic or an unattainable skill. ORSA High Power Service Rifle and Long-Range Rifle shooters routinely place 20 shots in groups smaller than the size of a dinner plate at 600 yards. You will receive one-on-one instruction from experienced competitors.

If you would like to learn about how to get started in this sport, please plan to join us on Saturday, March 16th, 2019, at 8:00 AM at the ORSA Indoor Range. You may bring your own US Service Rifle (AR-15, M1-Garand, or M1-A and ammo); or, use a club rifle and ammo. If you bring your gear, the cost is \$5.00. If you are using ORSA rifle, ammo and equipment; the cost is \$30.00.

If you wish to participate, please read and follow these instructions: RSVP to Alan Strachn at: alanstrachn@gmail.com. AND Answer the following questions:

- What is your name, email address, and are you 18 or older?
- Are you furnishing your own rifle and ammo?
- Will you need a club AR-15? (note: only club ammo may be fired in these rifles)
- What is your suit jacket size? (helps us fit you with a shooting jacket)
- Are you left-handed?

Please Read and Follow These Instructions:

- Schedule: Report to the ORSA Indoor Range at 8:00 AM Saturday, March 16th.
- You will register, be fitted with a shooting jacket and mitt, be assigned a Relay and Target, and be paired with a coach. Additionally, an introductory course of instruction will be provided.

Course of Fire: All Firing Conducted from 200 Yards

- 5 prone slow fire sighter shots
- 10 shots prone slow fire
- 10 shots rapid fire fired from the prone position with a magazine change
- 10 shots rapid fire fired from the sitting position with a magazine change
- 10 shots slow fire standing

Fees:

- \$30.00 for club rifle, ammo, and equipment
- \$5.00 if participant brings their own rifle, equipment and ammo

Range Requirements, Safety, and Comfort:

- Eye and Ear Protection are Required on all ORSA Ranges and must be furnished by participants
- Dress for the weather predicted

DEMOCRAT CONGRESS = GUN CONTROL

On the anniversary of the shooting of former Democrat Rep. Gabby Giffords the new Democrat majority in the House plans on introducing legislation to expand background checks for sales and transfers of firearms.

House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., called the bill on background checks a common-sense measure and cited polls showing 97 percent of Americans support background checks for all gun sales.

First, the 97 percent Rep. Pelosi cites is just a lie. It has been used by the media for years and has been debunked repeatedly.

Second, the bill would have to also pass the Republican majority in the Senate which is not likely. Then the bill would ultimately have to be signed by President Trump which is never going to happen.

Third, and most importantly, a bill of this nature would require gun registration. Even President Obama’s own Dept. of Justice stated that any type of “universal background checks” would necessitate a registration system. There is simply no other way to control the sale and transfer of firearms without a registration system.

Fourth, we already have a firearms background check system. It works when used properly.

Fifth, a bill of this nature would do nothing to prevent criminal violence (I say this instead of the fear-mongering “gun violence”) where guns are used. Of course criminals don’t go through any background system to arm themselves.

THE USA IS NOT 1ST IN MASS SHOOTINGS - WE’RE 63RD! THE LIBERAL MEDIA LIES

Why cannot liberals tell the truth? We saw it in the Kavanaugh hearings, women coming forward claiming to have been raped only to announce later that they had made it up and “just wanted to help.” It is barely understandable when you see individuals do it. It is totally unacceptable when you see academics do it. Such is the case of Adam Lankford, a professor at Alabama. Simply put it appears he just made up his research to provide a result that made him popular with the left. His study claims the U.S. is the leader in mass shootings.

FLORIDA NEWSPAPER PUBLISHES EXHAUSTIVE PARKLAND REPORT: SHERIFF’S OFFICE ‘COST CHILDREN THEIR LIVES’

Authorities and school officials either failed to act or were unclear about procedures when confronting the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School shooter Feb. 14, 911 logs, surveillance videos, and interviews show.

The South Florida Sun Sentinel released a minute-by-minute rundown of the Parkland, Florida, shooting in “Unprepared and Overwhelmed.” The Sentinel acknowledged many teachers and police officers were “heroic,” but Broward County Public Schools and the Broward County Sheriff’s

Office were hesitant and disorganized as a whole. The shooting left 17 people dead.

“A gunman with an AR-15 fired the bullets, but a series of blunder, bad policies, sketchy training and poor leadership helped him succeed,” the Sentinel wrote.

There were three separate instances of school monitors failing to lock down the school and call for a Code Red, an indicator for people to hide in classrooms. A watchman spotted suspected gunman Nikolas Cruz on campus at 2:19 p.m., but no one called a Code Red until 2:24 p.m.

The fire alarm added to the confusion, causing uninformed teachers and students to leave their classrooms unaware of the active shooter. Additionally, bathroom doors required a key to unlock—reportedly to prevent students from vaping in them—and one of the teachers accidentally locked his classroom door behind him.

The district also failed to follow through on classrooms having “hard corners,” or places to be out of sight, after security experts advised teachers to do so.

Deputy Scot Peterson, the school’s resource officer, was the only armed person on campus before reinforcements arrived. He failed to confront the shooter, according to the report.

Peterson ordered the school to go on lockdown at 2:25 p.m., but did not order deputies to head toward the building. He also remained in a sheltered location for 48 minutes.

“Basically, what we’re trained to do is just get right to the threat as quick as possible and take out the threat because every time you hear a shot go off it could potentially be a kid getting killed or anybody getting killed for that matter,” neighboring Coral Springs Officer Raymond Kerner said, the Sentinel reported.

The report also showed the Broward County Sheriff’s Office’s disjointed 911 system was partially responsible for the slowed response time along with radio and video problems.

DRACONIAN GUN CONTROL DOES NOT REDUCE GUN NUMBERS OR HOMICIDE RATES

A large number of people who wish to disarm the population start with the premise “If there weren’t any guns”, as if, with extreme restrictions on owning and using guns, guns will eventually go away. Under extreme legal restrictions, the number of guns has increased.

Guns are a 700 to 1000 - year-old technology. Guns can, and are, being made in homes and small shops around the world that are beyond state control.

Firearms have had extreme legal restrictions imposed over most of the planet. The United States is exceptional, with the Second Amendment. Most governments allow only small

numbers of their people to legally have firearms.

People under those governments actively resist those laws. In spite of a century and a half of stringent restrictions on gun ownership, the number of guns in private hands has risen significantly.

The *Small Arms Survey* has created the best estimates of the number of small arms in private hands in other countries of the world. The number increased from 650 million in 2006 to 857 million in 2017. Most people will accept the *Small Arms Survey* as a legitimate source.

Small Arms Survey tries to objectively gather data, although their mission has an inherent bias toward disarmament.

My estimate for firearms in civilian hands in the United States in 2017, was 418 million. The *Small Arms Survey* estimate was 393 million. Severe gun restrictions were implemented in India, under the British Raj. It happened very quickly after the mutiny/insurrection in 1857. The law was codified into statute in 1877. There have been 160 years of strict controls on the ownership of firearms in India.

What country has the most firearms in civilian hands after the United States? According to the *Small Arms Survey*, it is India. Only 13.6 percent of those guns are legally owned.

Citizens of India are said to have 71.1 million firearms in private hands, with 9.7 million of them being registered, and thus legal.

A *Small Arms Survey* paper reported that in India, 2.5 million illegal craft-made guns are manufactured annually. The quality of craft-made Indian guns has been improving from simple single shots to semi-automatic handguns.

The *Small Arms Survey* estimates only 12 percent of firearms owned by civilians in the world are registered.

The next largest number of privately held firearms is in China, at nearly 50 million! Only 1.4 percent of those are registered. The *Small Arms Survey* reports that craftsmen in the Songtao Miao Autonomous County in Guizhou province make black market semi-automatic pistols for about \$45 each. In the coastal cities, they sell for about \$1500.

Brazil has very strict gun control laws. According to the *Small Arms Survey*, Brazil has 8.29 total firearms per 100 people. Of those, illegal firearms are over half, 4.52 per 100. China has 3.53 illegal firearms per 100 people. India has 4.58 illegal firearms per 100 people.

The US has more than 120 firearms per 100 people. It is hard to say how many illegal firearms are in the US. Very few firearms in the US are registered or required to be registered.

Brazil has roughly as many illegal firearms per person as India or China. The US has a private firearm ownership rate, per 100 people, 14 times the rate of both legal and illegal firearms ownership in Brazil.

Ten percent of the murders committed, in the world, are committed in Brazil. The vast majority of them are committed with illegally owned firearms. There were four times as many murders in Brazil as in the US, in 2017. Brazil's population is smaller.

The comparison of firearms ownership in India, China, the US, and Brazil is illustrative of two things.

First, the number of legally owned firearms has little to do with the number of illegally owned firearms.

Second, the number of firearms per person has no correlation with the number of homicides.

Brazil, India, and China all have roughly the same number of illegally owned firearms per 100 people. The homicide rates vary from six times the rate of the U.S. (Brazil) to 2/3 the rate of the U.S. (India) to one eighth the rate of the U.S. (China).

These numbers verify the research of John Lott, which shows there is no correlation between homicide numbers and the number of guns owned per 100 people. Lott's study compares all the countries in the world he could obtain data from.

Consider the first point: there is no correlation of the number of legally owned guns to the number of illegally owned guns. This alone shows that legal restrictions on guns does not reduce the number of illegally owned guns.

Making guns hard to legally own and use does not reduce the homicide rate. It does not reduce the number of guns owned illegally.

The hard evidence, from 160 years of highly restrictive gun control laws, is they do not affect the murder rate or the number or rate of illegally owned guns. Governments have not been able to confiscate illegally owned guns faster than people are able to make, buy, steal or smuggle guns to add to the illegal stockpile.

The idea that gun control works by limiting the number of guns, and thus reducing crime is false.

The studies that purport to show a correlation, suffer from various forms of statistical sleight of hand. They limit their study scope to short time periods and/or geographic areas. They limit the homicides counted to those committed with guns. They create artificial definitions of "developed nations" to cherry pick what numbers to look at.

Making guns hard to legally own, at the whim of a government, is a form of virtue signaling. It sends the message: Guns are bad.

It has nothing to do with crime or the homicide rate. It has nothing to do with the numbers of illegally owned guns. The theory that restricting legal gun ownership reduces crime rates is false.

Well-governed societies have low crime rates. Some have few restrictions on gun ownership, some are very restrictive. It does not change crime rates.

There may be a few hundred thousand or a hundred million legal gun owners. It does not matter. There is no correlation between legally owned guns and homicides or crime.

The similarities of the number of illegally owned guns in Brazil, India, and China, and the enormous differences in homicide rates, from 30.9 in Brazil to .63 in China (per 100,000) shows that illegal gun ownership is inconsequential compared to cultural, political, and other factors.

Gun control is not about homicides or safety. It is about telling you what the ruling establishment wants you to think. <https://www.ammoland.com/2018/12/draconian-gun-control-does-not-reduce-gun-numbers-or-homicide-rates/#ixzz5bZa50sy1>
